

Girls Like That and other plays for Teenagers Evan Placey






The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time Mark Haddon

When he discovers a dead dog on a neighbour's lawn, he decides to solve the mystery and write a detective thriller about it. As in all good detective stories, the more he unearths, the deeper the mystery gets.


Blood Brothers Willy Russell

A Liverpudlian West Side Story: twin brothers are separated at birth because their mother cannot afford to keep them both. She gives one of them away to wealthy Mrs Lyons and they grow up as friends in ignorance of their fraternity until the inevitable quarrel unleashes a blood-bath. One of the longest-running and most successful ever West End musicals, Blood Brothers premiered at the Liverpool Playhouse in January 1983.

Frankenstein Mary Shelley adapted by Philip Pullman


Play edition for Key Stage Three students, adapted from Mary Shelley's novel Frankenstein.


Teechers John Godber


DNA Dennis Kelly

A new edition of Shakespeare's historical tragedy about an army general driven mad by his murderous actions to take the Scottish throne.


